To the Saints of First Presbyterian:

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

Or soon will be! We are coming up to Easter this month. For two years we have hobbled along, hiding from each other, trying not to get Covid-19. Now at last, things are beginning to seem normal again. At long last, life will go on.

For the short term: masks are now optional at the church. Barring an outbreak of a bad variant, they will remain that way. This means we can come and sing our hearts out on Easter, no masks.

The Holy Week and Easter schedule will be in this newsletter on another page, but we will have our traditional Tenebrae communion service on Maundy Thursday. There will be a Community Good Friday service at Noon on Friday, April 15th, with yours truly preaching, in the chapel. Then on Easter we will have a Sunrise service at 7:00 a.m. (The sun will rise at 6:47 a.m., but that seemed weird.) After that service we will share breakfast in the fellowship hall — the first congregational meal in two years! There will be an Easter egg hunt on the Deal Lot at 9:00 a.m., and at 10:00 a.m., we worship in the sanctuary together, with all the music our musicians can muster! It will be a great day! Bring your friends!


After Easter, we will continue to have worship at 10:00 a.m., on the Deal lot. We will do this for a few weeks, at least. The Session has heard the concerns about safety, heat, and the insects, and agreed to reconsider this decision at the May meeting. So we may not be out there all summer. As someone said, “we have two perfectly good sanctuaries. Why sit outside?”

One part of this is to enjoy nature’s beauty. While the preacher is droning on about Nahum, you can look at the trees and listen to the birds. God gave us this world filled with beauty; let’s enjoy it.

As we did before, we will have a very short range FM radio link to the microphones, which you can pick up in your car, if you prefer to stay seated there. I will be working with our set-up crew and leadership to try and create some seating at the edge of the parking lot, so that you can sit there if the ground is too treacherous for you. We want everyone to be happy and have choices.

You know, I have done a lot of things in my ministry. I have lived through the sudden retirement of a very long-term senior pastor, a bitter interim of almost three years, the comings and goings of some associate pastors, several capital campaigns, and a major building project. All of these could be planned and were executed with reasonable success. But Covid? Who could have foreseen two years of making do? Who could train one for this? It’s a mystery! But now we are back! Get excited, for the best is yet to come!

Did you know . . . ?

The Property Committee is pleased to announce the former CMO nursery has been converted into a Community Meeting Room that is easily accessible from the church's rear parking lot.



For a number of years this room was part of the nursery for the Children's Morning Out Program. The room and cabinetry have been cleaned and painted with new cabinet hardware as well as installed new counter top and sink. There is plenty of counter space if you need to serve refreshments. There are enough tables and chairs to seat 14 for a table top meeting and 35 for theater style seating. Restrooms are just across the hall from this new meeting room.

The purpose of refurbishing this room is to provide an easy, accessible space for meetings such as: Session, Circle and Committee meetings. We can manage the HVAC system for this area more economically with small HVAC systems rather than the large cooling tower and boiler required to heat and cool rooms in the new building for just one room. If you use the room and see other items that would benefit your group in using this space please let me know.

Special thanks to the Wednesday Work Group for making this project happen. Considerable hours were devoted to change out this room to what it is now. Please go by and check out this new and improved space within our church. - Charles Moody, Chair Property Committee


FPC Music Ministry News

With the coming of Spring and moving into April, we will soon be celebrating Easter. After two years of the COVID pandemic, we can finally have Holy Week and Easter services as they were in 2019. We look forward to the glorious music we will hear and sing for our worship.

On Palm Sunday, we will remember Christ's ride into Jerusalem and the celebration. The choir will sing "Lift Up Your Heads" from *Messiah* by Handel. Then, we will remember how things changed for Jesus during the week. On Thursday, April 14th, we will have our Maundy Thursday service at 7:00 p.m. During this service, we remember Jesus sharing the Last Supper with the disciples and his telling them that one of them would betray him that night. We will move from the last supper to the Tenebrae service. Through scripture, hymns, and anthems, we will remember Christ's last night, his trial, his suffering, and finally his death on the cross. The choir will sing an anthem named "Show Me Your Cross", which has the text of "O Sacred Head Now Wounded" sung to a different tune. Many of our church members have shared that the Maundy Thursday service is one that is the most meaningful to their Lenten worship.

On Easter Sunday, what a celebration we will have at First Presbyterian! The celebration will start with an Easter Sunrise service followed by a full breakfast provided by the Session. An Easter egg hunt will take place on the Deal lot. Easter morning worship will start at 9:45 a.m. with brass quartet, organ, and piano. Our celebratory morning will continue with Easter morning worship at 10:00 a.m. with organ and brass leading our hymns and anthems, and the Easter story shared in scripture, sermon, and song.

Family Care Center Silent Auction



For the second year in a row our Discipleship Sunday school class was given the opportunity to contribute a “themed basket” for the Family Care Center Silent Auction; instead, we collected enough for one huge basket and three smaller ones, plus a small cash donation.

Some of the ladies who are also in Circle 5 (Kay Long, Fran Whitaker, Suzanne Rhinehart, Karen McDougal and Ellie Induni) put the baskets together or made contributions for them. The baskets contained Equal Exchange products—coffee, chocolates, cashews, and olive oil, in various combinations, and coffee mugs (as shown below). The Family Care Center (FCC) supports programs for homeless families in our area.

Here are some important aspects of their work:

- Each year they shelter approximately 225 family members who have found themselves homeless due to under-employment, domestic violence, eviction and natural disasters.
- Over 85% of their families successfully transition to permanent housing thanks to the support of their social worker’s case management, life-skills workshops they offer, and special programs for the children who reside with them.

According to the most recent US Census, 17% of our population in this area lives in poverty. FCC works to break the bonds of generational poverty and give these homeless families a hand up, not a hand-out as they work toward self-sustainment.

RIP MEDICAL DEBT

Help us bring the Joy of Easter to our Neighbors by eliminating \$1,000,000 of Medical Debt in Western NC!

Please join the Presbytery-wide effort to address systemic poverty as we highlight the effects of medical debt for the un-insured and under-insured. We are months into a campaign that will culminate at our

April 26, 2022 Presbytery meeting. Our shared goal is to eliminate \$1,000,000 of medical debt held by neighbors here in Western North Carolina.

Impossible? Not at all, because we don’t have to collect \$1 million dollars, but a more easily attainable \$10,000. We are partnering with the non-profit **RIP Medical Debt**, an organization that purchases debt from debt-collectors in bundled portfolios. \$1 donated abolishes \$100 of medical debt.

RIP Medical Debt works to *forgive* debt rather than collect on it. Working with third-party credit data providers, RIP searches bundled debt portfolios to locate accounts meeting our criteria for financial relief. RIP then negotiates to buy portfolios at a steep discount, on average a penny on the dollar. Prior to RIP's purchase, many of these bills have passed through several collection agencies and months or years of collection pursuit. Others are purchased or donated directly from hospitals & doctors’ groups. RIP offers to purchase these accounts at their present industry market value. **The humanitarian difference is that once RIP buys this debt, we forgive it on behalf of our donor, removing derogatory credit marks that would hobble their finances for years.**

See? The Presbytery can easily eliminate \$1,000,000 of medical debt in Western North Carolina, all we need to do is raise \$10,000; and as of this writing, we’re nearly half-way towards our goal! The Missions Committee is planning on making a donation for this effort, but the congregation is encouraged to donate if you feel so led. Please make checks payable to *FPC-Newton with “RIP Debt Relief”* on the check memo line.



Update from El Redentor

Recently we had a wonderful opportunity to meet by Zoom with the elders of our sister church, El Redentor in Guatemala. Since we have not been able to have face to face visits for over two years, this provided a valuable way to stay in touch.

Prayer requests: They shared updates on the families of the church and prayer requests, some of which you will see printed in the bulletin and the newsletter. Please contact Mimi Michael if you would like the complete list of prayer needs. Prayer is a very important way that we can support our brothers and sisters through the many challenges they face.

Children’s scholarships: A new school year has begun, and they reported on the scholarships that were awarded for this school year. Ten students in primary school are receiving \$87 scholarships, five students in middle school are receiving \$185 scholarships, and five students in high school are receiving \$247 scholarships. The scholarship money comes from our church budget, PW groups, and Matthew’s Market and is used for uniforms, books, supplies, internet, and transportation. We cannot overestimate the value of these scholarships to the children and their future. There have been 20 graduates from this small church since 2013; many would not have been able to stay in school without the support of our church. THANK YOU! There are eight new students who need sponsors to pray for them and write occasionally. Please consider this ministry opportunity and let Mimi Michael know if you are interested or want more information.

Other scholarships: We are pleased to report that Dayana Rojas has graduated with a degree in nursing and is currently studying for an additional license, Uzias Rodas is in his third year at the university studying to be a teacher, and Humberto Robles, an elder of the church, is taking classes at the seminary. Thank you for your valuable support of these efforts!

We are grateful for the many years of partnership we have enjoyed with El Redentor and for the benefits we all experience. Many thanks for caring about these brothers and sisters in Christ! They value your relationships very much.



One Great Hour of Sharing

The Presbyterian Church (USA) collects four Special Offerings throughout the year which allows the whole Church to join together in response to God’s grace. They represent the largest, collective way Presbyterians come together to work for a better world. We will be serving communion again in August. Please contact Laura Sparks if you would like to help serve.





Circle of Sisters Book Club




